FAKE NEWS OF ALT VIEWS OF HISTORY! WHO KNOWS ?

n today's world one never knows whether something is Fake News or just an Alternate View of History. However, in the halcyon days of our youth, there was certainly only one TRUTH, and it was unvarnished and immutable! Or was it?

Let us consider the case of the naming of Rose Drive at the Read Reservation, formerly known as Camp Read, to us old timers at Brant Lake, NY.

So, what is the TRUE story of the naming of Rose Drive? For those who cannot remember, Rose Drive is the first left turnoff from the main camp road, just past the Ranger's House and the Garage. It goes up to some of the Waubeeka sites, and also to the New Farm House (which is now called just the "Farm House," because the Old Farm House is more correctly called Boland Lodge).

Well, it turns out there are at least three versions of the entomology (*Editor: clearly not the right word.* Hmmmm, ok what about etymology? *Editor: better but not it!* How about: etiology? *Editor: Yes, that is it...spot on!*) of the naming of Rose Drive. These three TRUE versions are presented below. The Editor gladly opens the floor here for some "Letters to the Editor" to engender any further comments, critiques, corrections, dissenting opinions or versions.

First up is a presentation by the erstwhile curmudgeon <u>Sir James Joseph Smith</u>, originally from Blackfoot and North Tarrytown (now called Sleepy Hollow), and who is happily ensconced in the sunny state of Florida.

In the 1950s, Frank Teal was on the Professional Staff of the Council, (then known as the Washington Irving Council, BSA.) Frank was also the Business Manager for Camp Read. To say the least, he was not the most popular member of the camp staff, as he carried out his function of watching over the fiscal needs of camp often focusing on cutting costs (and corners) and denying requests for items as being "unbudgeted" or "over budget."

Frank and his family lived in one of the trailers located behind Boland Lodge. The family consisted of Frank, his wife Rose, their son Tom, and their daughter. Frank's nickname for some reason was FROG! I am not sure if he was aware of that moniker. The large rock (a fair-sized Adirondack Erratic Boulder) on the camp road at the turn-off to the trailers and Boland Lodge was painted "GORF" in honor of this nickname. It was painted and repainted over the years by some of the staff who were not too enamored with Frank. That became a running staff joke.

But, I digress. Back to the Rose Drive story. When Bob Newton became the Camp Ranger, he raised a couple of pigs and kept them up on the very road we are discussing. At that time, it led over towards a Farm House on the Bent Lee Farm, the estate of Mr. Heller who was the Chairman of National Distilleries.



Again, some of the camp staff who were not too happy with Frank, put up a sign at the road to where Bob had kept his pigs, and the sign said "Rose Drive". And it became a tongue in cheek joke from then on as to whether it was named for Bob's pig, named Rose, or Frank's wife, also named Rose. It was one of those things that gets lost in time, after those involved have long since gone from the Camp Staff. Yet it is fondly remembered by those of us who have become involved with the Camp Read (Alumni) Association.

One of the ironies of all this is that Frank's son Tom went on to became one of Camp Read's most valued and loyal staff members. He served for years on the honorable Maintenance Crew with Art Boland, and was very popular with all those who knew and worked with him. Tom became one of the early Camp Read Association's best and most active members. He served diligently as Secretary of the Association for many years.



"For Joys We'll Ne'er Forget", relates the story of the Curtis S. Read Scout Reservation from its opening day in 1920 to the present. For the most part, "For Joys..." was written by staff who were in camp. Chapters features two legendary Camp Rangers, the launching of Camp Waubeeka, the impact of Read on professional Scouting, profiles of outstanding camp leaders, the story of the Oder of the Arrow in camp, history of the Camp Read Association, and much more.

Travel through time as this nearly one hundred year old camp grew from its beginnings on 33 acres and 20 campers on Long Pond, in Mahopac, New York to a 1000 acre scout reservation in the Adirondack Mountains. Today the Curtis S. Read Scout Reservation is made up of three camps, one traditional scout camp, one patrol cooking camp, and a High Adventure Base.

"For Joys We'll Ne'er Forget" was commissioned by the Camp Read Association to preserve the history of this very special place. If you were ever a camper or staff member at a Scout camp, you'll find yourself right at home in the pages of this book. It is a story worth telling and one worth reading!

Rose Drive - Story Continued from page 3:

Now we move on to the version submitted by <u>Ed D'Apice</u>, renowned chronicler of the historical (and hysterical) memorials and tributes at Camp Read, and official co-author and publisher of the Camp Read Historical Guidebook that describes them all:

Shortly after Council acquired a parcel of land adjacent to Camp Read (a part of the aforesaid Heller Estate), the then ranger, Bob Newton, began building a new road from the camp Garage to the Farmhouse on that property. One day, after work, Bob was going out with the boys. He showered before going out and inadvertently got a little over-zealous with his cologne. The boys got together in town that night and someone commented about how Bob "smelled pretty as a rose" and began calling him Rose as a nickname and as a tease. It was then that Bob thought it would be appropriate to name his road under construction "Rose Drive". Hence the name.

And now, not to be outdone by the aforesaid gentlemen, our FIRST PRESIDENT and a key founder of the Camp Read Association, <u>Thomas Dietz</u>, has weighed in on this crucial bit of Camp Read history and lore.

I can't remember who told this story to me, but let it be told that Rose Drive got its name this way: The local towns people gave Bob Newton the nickname of Rose because he would always come out of any situation smelling like a rose. When they needed a name for the road through Waubeeka to the newly acquired Farm House on the former Heller Estate, they called it Rose Drive, after Bob's locally inspired nickname.

Thus, it has been written. Let the immutable truth be discerned from the aforesaid with all due candor, honor and vicissitude. Fake News? I don't think so!!

Please consider helping out next year as we always have a good time and the Camp really does benefit from our efforts.




