****** PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends of Camp Read,

Since my last President's message, a lot has happened with the Camp Read Association and with the Read Reservation. There were some great accomplishments, some challenges, and some sadness during that time.

First the good news, there are several very exciting projects supported by the Association that have either been completed or are under way. Completed last Spring was the restoration of the stone wall flanking both sides of the camp road before the Ranger's house. Thanks to Peter Oberdorf who generously provided funding for this project. This is an example of a project that exemplifies our mission to help preserve historical structures and beautify the camp in the process. Another example of a project that is in line with our goals is the new Camp entrance sign that is in the design process and should be completed soon. Thanks to the "Two Guys Poker Tournament", who have provided major funding towards that project.

A major undertaking for the Association is the purchase and installation of two fishing docks, one for Waubeeka Lake and one for Rogers Lake in Buckskin, hopefully to be completed for 2023 summer camp opening. The Association has been working closely with the Council Fishing Committee to come up with a design and location for the docks. The McCabe family has already committed to provide the necessary funds for the Buckskin dock and significant money has already been raised towards the Waubeeka dock. There is an urgent need for donations for towards the Waubeeka dock and the supporting infrastructure around both docks to meet our goal, please consider giving what you can.

Now to the challenges. A major issue for the Reservation management was the ability to hire Staff. Despite their best efforts, only 65% of the positions were able to be filled and subsequently some programs had to be altered and others had been eliminated totally. Unfortunately, giving the current environment, camp fees in 2023 needed to significantly raised to cover the overall increased operating costs and raise staff salaries to make them more competitive.

To combat a major bear problem over the summer, Camp Waubeeka had to move their patrol cooking operations from troop sites to common areas. Electric fences had to be erected around cooking and garbage areas throughout the Reservation. To that end, the Council under the guidance of the NYS DEC has taken on a multi-phase capital project to establish "bear proof" cooking areas in Waubeeka.

Sadly, two long-time CRA members passed away recently, Kenneth D'Apice and David Terrible. Ken was a founding CRA Board Member, Professional Scouter and beloved brother of our Executive VP, Edward. We held an informal memorial service during the hike weekend, where several of our members spoke about Ken and how he positively affected their lives, the Camp and Scouting. Ed gave a heartfelt talk about their personal relationship. David was an active member of the Association and beloved father of long-time Board Member, Matt. Dave's love of the Scouting was demonstrated in his generosity to the Camp and the Association. They will both be sorely missed by all who knew them. Tributes to Ken and Dave can be found on pages 4&5 of this *Newsletter*.

Thanks to all those who took their valuable time to attend the work weekends, your efforts are much appreciated and are necessary for the Camp to continue to thrive. The "Eager Beaver" weekend held on June 10-12 was very successful for the limited amount of participants. We hope that Eager Beaver 2023 will have a larger turn out for this most important event, so mark you calendars for June 9-11, 2023 and join us to help get "our" camp ready for next summer!

The annual fall hike weekend at Camp Read was held on September 30th through October 2nd with 21 of our fellow members attending. Good times, good friends, good food and good weather highlighted the event. A brief recap for both events can be found on page 7 of this *Newsletter*. Check out the



Remembering Kenneth C. D'Apice February 15, 1951 – July 25, 2022 By Ron Green

Ken D'Apice, one of the iconic figures in the history of Camp Read was remembered for his many Scouting and other achievements at a Celebration of Life service held on July 29th in Orlando, Florida and again at Camp Read on October 1st.

Ken, an Eagle Scout from Yonkers, New York served on the Camp Read staff at Camp Tomahawk (present day Summit) from 1966 -1973. He became Camp Director of Tomahawk in 1974 and served as Buckskin Camp Director in 1975. Ken was the Read Reservation Director from 1977-1979. It was in this role and later as Camping

Director of the Westchester-Putnam Council that Ken established Camp Read as one of the premier camps in the Adirondack Mountains, and enabled it to survive, grow and flourish at a time when many other Scout camps were having difficulties.

Ken created and developed Camp Read's first High Adventure Camp, Summit Base Camp with ropes courses, rappelling, whitewater rafting and out of camp backpacking and canoe trips. He started the Trail to Eagle and other specialty camp weeks as well as the winter Ski Camps. He also co-founded the Camp Read Association and cowrote its mission statement and bylaws.

Ken was also a Professional Scouter beginning his career as a District Executive in the Westchester-Putnam Council in 1976. He also served the council



as Camping Director before becoming Development Director in the Greater New York Council. Following a stint as Director of Field Service in the Fairfield County Council, Ken was Scout Executive in Puerto Rico and then Suffolk County Council in New York. During his career Ken was recognized as one of the best leaders in the Northeast Region of the Boy Scouts of America.

Ken met his wife Monica while serving as Scout Executive in Puerto Rico. They were married for 28 years. Together their pride and joy was their daughter Isabella. Ken was a doting father who reveled in watching Isabella learn and grow.

The memorial service in Orlando, Florida was held before a packed chapel of family, friends, co-workers of his wife Monica, classmates of his daughter Isabella and church members. Ron Green and Denis Pisanello of the Camp Read Association and close personal friends of Ken's also attended. Denis brought an album of Camp Read staff photos covering four decades and Ron provided camp and Scouting photos for the video which ran throughout the service.

Pastor Drew Fletcher observed that Ken had two distinct and remarkable phases of his life, the early years and Scouting, and his later years as a lawyer, and devoted father and husband. He then read a very touching letter from Isabella that paid tribute to her father and what he meant to her.


Ron Green who also spoke at the service and served on camp staff with Ken and later on the staff of the Westchester-Putnam and the Greater New York Councils, remembered Ken as a boyhood hero, role model, mentor and friend for over 50 years.

Monica D'Apice followed with her own heartfelt comments and remembrances. She was especially emotional when she saw Denis Pisanello at the service.

At Camp Read, several of those attending the Fall Hike Weekend spoke about their friendship with Ken, serving on camp staff with him and what he meant to Camp Read. The highlight though was comments by his brother Ed, also an Eagle Scout, long tenured Camp Read staff member, and Executive Vice President of the Camp Read Association. Ed talked about Ken as a brother and the close relationship they had.

Ken was the son of Mario and Rita D'Apice. We will remember him as a Camp Read legend.

David Terribile June 6, 1930 – October 21, 2022



David exemplified what it meant to be a Scouter. The Association is fortunate to have multi-generational members like Dave and his son, Matt. It shows how this organization is truly a family affair and those bonds nurtured though Scouting last a lifetime.

Here is an except from his obituary as it demonstrates his love of Camp Read and his dedication to Scouting:

"David was a Boy Scout leader, first an Assistant Scoutmaster with Troop 332 in Queens Village, and then a Scoutmaster for over 10 years with Troop 5 of Pleasantville. He enjoyed outdoor adventures including cave exploring, canoeing, backpacking, white water rafting, and sailplaning. He camped many summers at Curtis S. Read Scout Reservation, where a canoe trailer he built with his iron working skills is still in use. Between 1985 and 2006 he backpacked at Philmont Scout Ranch, paddled the Boundary Waters at Northern Tier High Adventure Base and sailed at Florida Sea Base. David received both the District Award of Merit and the Silver Beaver for his service to Scouting.

David was a good cook and baker both at home and while camping. When his Boy Scout troop had bake sale fundraisers, he would bake a table full of pies and breads. His signature holiday meal was lasagna with meatballs and tomato sauce cooked all day. On camping trips he once cooked a chicken coated in mud on a bed of hot coals. Additionally, David took after his father, enjoying the garden. He planted fruit trees, ornamental shrubs, grape vines, and vegetables."

The Association Board is working with the Terribile family and the Greater Hudson Valley Council to identify an appropriate use of the money that is worthy of bearing his name and continuing his legacy.




